MORSA Annual Conference Set for Saturday, May 17, 2014

“Adaptive Uses of One-Room Schools” is the theme of the Michigan One-Room Schoolhouse Association annual conference to be held in Eaton Rapids on Saturday, May 17.

Location of the conference is Miller Farm and Historic Village in Eaton Rapids, which is located on M-99 18 miles southwest of Lansing. The site includes the 1870 Wright School, the 1864 Miller House, a dairy barn, an 1860 blacksmith shop, and perhaps most delicious of all, the famous Miller Ice Cream Factory (1896) and its adjoining 1940’s style Ice Cream Parlor.

Conference opens with registration at 8:30 a.m. and the program begins at 9:00 with greetings from MORSA chairman Tom M. Johnson and Deb Malewski, staff member of Miller Farm.

Morning programs will feature three illustrated descriptions by people who have adapted a one-room school for contemporary purposes:

- 1) Kay Bazzett will describe the building she has restored as her residence in Ottawa County, and the pros and cons of living in a restored schoolhouse. She will describe the

“It looks like Little Red Schoolhouse No. 9 in Redford has a date with the wrecking ball.”

The Little Red Schoolhouse, formally known as the Beech School, was built in 1874 at the time the railroad first came through the area known today as Redford, Township, Michigan, just west of Detroit. It is the last building standing from the railroad town of Beech and is located just in front of the United State Post Office on Beech Daly Road. It was used as a school until 1952. A wooden addition was put on in 1926/27. In 1988 it, along with a small amount of land, was sold by the South Redford School District to a developer in Farmington Hills, Michigan. At that

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time, the building was being used to store historic items for the township. In 1991 a Michigan Registered State Historic marker was erected in front of the school by the Michigan Historical Commission.

The October 6th, 2013 *Redford Observer* article reported that the owner intends to raze the school and asphalt the area to create additional parking for the post office. Bear in mind that post offices are handling less mail and the population of Redford Township has decreased in the past several decades. The developer and others allege that the building is not a historic structure because of the 1926/27 wooden addition – only the land is historic. It seems obvious that this argument is without merit for two reasons. First, the addition was added years before it was designated as a historic site and second, without the school, the land has no historic significance.


MORSA has become involved in this "David and Goliath" situation because of one individual, Jim Bailey, who is with the Community Development Cooperative, a nonprofit organization dealing with the areas of government oversight, persons with disabilities advocacy and trail advocacy. Jim has pursued this issue with vigor and has produced a video involving three of our board members with expertise in the history of one room schoolhouses. They all gave factual information to refute the claim that the school is not a historic structure. At Jim's request, representing MORSA, I have written two letters protesting the planned destruction of this historic school. MORSA's position is that a new use should be sought, preferably one that would be of a financial benefit to the post office.
